

Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

This one and a half story Greek Revival house is a box with a small-scale rear addition that forms an L-shaped floor plan. The house has a steep gable roof with projecting eaves and a pedimented gable roof over the non-original front porch. The front facade is symmetrically composed with a one/one, double-hung window on either side of the entry. The gable ends also have one/one, double-hung windows. On the ground floor there is a single window in the elevation facing east and a three-sided bay with a flat roof on the west elevation. The bay and all window openings have cornices. The building is clad in shiplap siding with corner boards. A garage with a low-pitched gable roof and shiplap siding has been added off the southeast corner.

History

The Dibble House was moved from the northeast corner of Park and Ash Streets sometime after the late 1940's.
