Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

This one and a half story Bungalow house exhibits a square floor plan and shingle cladding. There is a frieze and boxed cornice below the north-south oriented hip roof with a roof on the cornices below the gable ends. Centered on the ridge is a corbeled chimney.

The inset front porch along the north facade features four Ionic style columns on a low wall, a centered, single-light door, paired one/one, double-hung windows on the east and a small single-light window on the west. In the center of the second floor there are three one/one, double-hung windows with a bracketed sill and a projected cornice that crosses the gable end. A small four-light window is located low in each corner.

A one-story hip roof addition running along the south facade has a porch with square posts and a metal stovepipe on the southeast corner. A three-sided, one-story, hip roof bay with one/one, double-hung windows is located on the east facade next to the addition. There is a single-light window and paired multi-light basement windows beside the front porch. The second floor features paired one/one, double-hung windows below a projected, bracketed cornice that crosses the gable end.

A flat roof, open garage has been added on the south corner of the west facade. The gable end contains a one/one, double-hung window flanked by small, four/one, double-hung windows beneath a cornice.

History

Joseph S. and Merittâ Belle Northrup occupied this house from 1912 to 1918 after moving here from Kansas. Northrup was known for running the first automobile and tire store in Lebanon on Main and Vine Streets. Joe Northrup started in Lebanon renting mules for farm labor and after selling the house the family moved to a farm in Halsey, Oregon. C. P. and I. Hassler purchased the residence from the Northrups, leaving their farm near Lacombe, Oregon.
