Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

Colonial Revival details appear on this two and a half story residence with a square floor plan. The building has a salt-box shape with a front porch where the roof drops down over the first floor. The porch has four Tuscan columns and a new door that is framed by fluted pilasters, a cornice, and multi-light sidelights. On the right side of the porch there is a new exterior brick chimney with flanking one/one, double-hung windows. In the center of the roof there is a five-sided hip roofed dormer. In the front there are three double-hung windows below multi-light windows. On each side there is a double-hung window with a multi-light upper sash. The chimney punches through the porch roof and rises to the right of the dormer. Two corbeled chimneys located at the center on each side of the ridge have been removed.

The west elevation features an oriel window between the first and second floors with three double-hung windows on each side. Centered above, at the attic level, there is an oval window with four lights and keystone-like decorations. On the left side of the first floor there is a pair of double-hung windows with upper sashes containing diamond-shaped leaded glass, and on the right there is a large one/one, double-hung window with a short upper

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sash. On the second floor there is a small horizontal two-light sliding window on the left and a double-hung window on the right. There are returned eaves and the verges are kept close to the building. Off the rear there is a one-story shed roofed addition with a single light window.

The rear elevation has a gable dormer with a two-light window. The addition runs along the rear featuring two windows and a door. There is a hip roofed wing at the left that is integrated into the larger shed roof addition.

The east elevation on the first floor has three one-light windows on the left, and on the right three double-hung windows with upper sashes containing diamond-shaped leaded glass. On the second floor there are two double-hung windows on the right and a single double-hung window on the left. At the attic level there is a large new three-light window. There are returned eaves with the verges held close to the building and the roof bells out over the porch. The entire house is clad with horizontal siding.

History

The First Presbyterian Church located to the east built this home as a parsonage but it has been in private ownership much of the time since construction. The house further to the east was also used by the church as a residence.
