## Senior Class History

On the 15 th of September, 1937, a hot sultry autumn day, freshman student. numbering 125, from many different schools, assembled together to experience a new adventure. After having found their bearings the freshman organized under the supervision of Miss Schiltz and elected their officers: President, Bill Pengra; Vice-president, Marybeth Whetstone; Secretary, Virginia Gorman; and Treasurer, Bob Sylvester

As time drew nearer for initiation, the atmosphere around the freshman seemed a little bit strange, but they bravely took it for a week, presenting an assembly on Friday and later the "greenies" received generous helpings of green ice cream.

Sixteen members of the band were freshmen and were really proud and boastful when they returned from the state band contest with top honors. Harold Post won the cornet solo in the class B division.

The class was well represented by vocal students, a freshman girls' quartet, composed of Joan Schenk, soprano; Marjorie Stringer, second soprano; Lorelei Stewart, alto; and Marjorie Sutter, second alto, were well praised on the successful work that they had done.

This year ended with many new friends formed, talents revealed and final preparations being made for a sopohomore year.

In September of 1938, the sophomores-with five less members than the previous year-enrolled to begin another nine months of school with Miss Bennett as advisor and the following officers: Bruce Campbell, President; Chet Simpson, Vice-president; Walter Johannsen, Secretary; Ruth Schackman, Treasurer, and Marian Standley, Representative.

Again this year the sophomores boasted sixteen members in the band. The same freshman girls' quartet was in existence with Had Reeves and Gene McKinney, also entering in the picture of music in the boys' quartet.

The class was well represented in sports with Chet Simpson, Robert Standley, John Mackey, Jack Lemons, Hal Michels, and Harold Post out to try to win letters.

This year saw the leaving of many old students and the arrival of new ones.

In 1939, 105 enthusiastic juniors marched to school with the hope of making this their biggest year. They had plans and ideas that would fill the year. Mr. Scott, new to the students, was advisor and supervised the first class meeting which was for the purpose of electing officers, results which were: President, Jack Lemons; Vice-president, Geneva Brown; Secretary, Ruth Schackman; Treasurer, Gene McKinney ;and Representative, George Dewey.

The juniors marked off their first date on the calendar by presenting the class play, "Aaron Slick from Pumpkin Crick" with Jim Winn, Dorothy Burton, Marjorie Stringer, Bob Davis, Marybeth Whetstone, Lorelei Stewart, and Jack Lemons portraying leading parts and other juniors enacting their parts well in making the play a success. Mr. Scott was director.

Many dances were sponsored which were said to be the best dances of the year.

The need for money was partly solved by selling hot dogs and ice cream in the halls during the noon hour.

Why the need for money? To sponsor the outstanding event of the year, the Junior-Senior Prom which was held May 10 at the close of May day when Queen Betty I and her royal court were guests of honor. The theme was carried out in Hawaiian style with Al Benning's orchestra furnishing the music.

The operetta, "The Mikado", had several Juniors playing leading parts, those being Joan Schenk, Gene McKinney and Had Reeves.

Ten juniors were selected as member of the National Honorary Society, Geneva Brown, Dorothy Burton, Dorothy Coyle, Joan Knowlen, Harold Michels, Jeannette Pape, Harold Post, Ruth Schackman, Lorelei Siewart and Lucille Warnke.

The climax of the year, came with the Junior Senior picnic which was held on May 17 at the coast.

On September 16, 1940, 93 seniors entered the halls of dear old L. H. S. for the last time, but more serious and sophisticated (maybe a bit sad too) than they were four years ago.

Mr Bryan was class advisor with officers being: Geneva Brown, President; Ruth Schackman, Vice-president; Ruth Zimbrick, Secretary; Walter Johannsen, Treasurer, and Dorothy Burton, Representative.

Although the seniors' duty is to initiate the freshmen, juniors and sophomores joined in a two-day initiation of the new members of L. H. S. which they took bravely, but not too gladly.

This year as in the past, the senior class was represented by several orators: Dorothy Burton, Joyce Den Herder, Geneva Brown, and George Dewey. The former three participated in the American Legion and Willamette State Forensic Contest and George in the latter contest and the F. F. A. Speecli contest.

On March 1, the seniors journeyed to Salem for a day where they enjo\%ed a tour of the more important state buildings.

A thrilling and exciting play was presented on April 4 under the able direction of Kee Buchanan. It was altogether a new and different "Molly O'Shaughnessey", with Marjorie Stringer, Howard Hughes, George Dewey, Gene Fitzwater, Walter Johannsen, Wayne Miller, Harold Michels, Lorelei Stewart, Gene McKinney, Dorothy Burton, Lucille Voegelein, Geneva Brown, Jeannette Pape, and Doris Taylor, and many others taking part.s The scene was set in Klamath County in the early 1890's with cowboys, rustlers, gunfire, and mystery keeping the scenes filled with surprises and fun.

The seniors were represented well in sports with seventeen lettermen in the class, several of them winning letters in three sports.

Several customs have been changed this year, one of them being that the class of " 41 " will wear caps and gowns for graduation, being the first class to do this. The other change is the holding of a class night on June 2 at which the awards will be presented and the class will and prophecy read.

With the officers of the class five seniors were appointed to form a standing committe to help with the solving of class problems. Those seniors were: Jeannette Pape, Wilma Green, Marjorie Stringer, Doris Taylor and LeRoy Eubank, They selected as their class colors maroon and blue and camellia for the flower. "Tonight We Launch, Where Shall We Anchor?" was chosen for the motto.
