The building stands on the most beautiful campus in the state and recently has been considerably enlarged by the addition of a gymnasium, home economics building, and even more recently by a new machine shop.



SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

On the eleventh day of September, 1939, a warm sultry autumn day, 124 freshmen students from many different districts, assembled together to experience a new adventure. After having found their bearings, the freshmen organized under the supervision of Miss Doris Hageman and elected their officers: Bill Bauman, president; Tom Standley, vice president; Aliene Miller, secretary; Charlotte Curtis, treasurer; and Wendell Cook, class representative.

Initiation was the first big step to be taken before they became full-fledged high school students. It was a step which they took bravely and with as much enthusiasm as they could muster under the circumstances.

Members of the class were active in athletics, F. F. A., dramatics, glee, band, Hi-Light, and other activities of the school. Many of the students also won places on the honor roll.

In May, the class staged a skating party in Albany. The party was a great success, due mainly to the excellent attendance.

Before the year had closed, many new students had entered the halls and rooms of our class, bringing the grand total to 139 students. With a larger class, the freshmen were well prepared to meet the challenges of their sophomore year.

On September 16, 1940, the sophomores with a smaller class of 125 students, again entered the doors of dear old Lebanon High to begin another nine months of school. With Mrs. Shanks as advisor, the class elected the following officers: president, Jim Shephard; vice president, Tom Standley; secretary, Barbara Dewey; treasurer, Blythe Lenox; and representative, Ramona Warnke.

The class was well represented in both band and glee, and numerous other clubs in the school.

In sports, a number of the boys were well on their way to making letters, namely: Bill Bauman, Tom Standley, Ray Webb, and Calvin Jennings.

This year a number of our students left, but their places were refilled by 17 new students.

In the year 1941, 125 enthusiastic juniors arrived at school with the hope of becoming successful upperclassmen.

Under the supervision of Mr. Page and Mr. Helser, advisors, the following officers were elected: Reid Meritt, president; Don Cox, vice president; Arlene McPherson, secretary; Shirley Dillard, treasurer; and Dalton Johnson, representative.

The junior year of the class of '43 contained many musical members. Among them were Laverne Stewart, who sang alto in the Girls Trio, and Gladys Stone who was a member of the clarinet quartet The class had one exceptional trumpet player, Norman Leckband, and five other members in the band and an additional number in the glee club.

This year the juniors did something entirely new. Under the capable direction of Maxine Winn, they presented a carnival, the first of its kind to be held in the Lebanon High gymnasium.

Through the success of the Juinor Carnival, the Junior-Senior Prom was financed. The theme was "Spring Fantasy" and the music was furnished by an Oregon State College dance band. It was the most successful event of the year. At this event, Queen Nancy and her royal court was honored. The Prom Committee consisted of Jean Post, Sally Irvine, Gladys Stone, Laverne Stewart and Maxine Winn.

The class now boasts of many well-qualified athletes, namely: Ted Daily, Dalton Johnson, Jim Irvine, Bill Manela, Calvin and Alvin Jennings, Wendell Cook, Jim Shepherd, and Roland King.

Among the outstanding juniors were two boys, Reid Meritt and Don Cox, who for the first time in Lebanon High school history, became editors of the high school paper during their junior year. Reid was editor the first semester and Don the second. Up until this time the position of editor has been given to a senior.

On September 21, 1942, the seniors took up their books and entered the halls of Lebanon high school for their last but most successful year.

Under the capable leadership of Roland King, president; Harold Harden, vice president; Blanche North, secretary; Blythe Lenox, treasurer; and Wendell Cook, representative, the class was off to a grand start. Miss Aebischer and Mr. Bates were class advisors.


Don Penfold and Jean Esmond well represented the class as outstanding orators. Don won the county contest and entered the district contest at Corvallis.

Baccalaureate services will be held on the evening of May 23. The following Wednesday, May 26, commencement exercises will be held. Thus, the largest class in L. H. S. history, the 101 remaining seniors, will be graduated from Lebanon high school.

The close of their high school days is drawing nearer and nearer. It won't be long until they will all leave the halls of their dear old Alma Mater to seek Success in the outside world. They are faced with the trials and tribulation of a great nation at war. Will they choose the path that leads to victory and everlasting peace, or will they be the "slackers" that could cause the downfall of what America stands for? Today as never before the graduating classes of all America have a prominent place in this country to fill.

The sophomore class has been prominent in many of the clubs, social activities, and athletics of the school and they shall continue to do so until they graduate.


FRESHMAN CLASS

At this time it was announced that Calvin Jennings, quarterback, was selected by his teammates as honorary captain for the '42 campaign just completed and Jack Beach, guard, was also selected as captain for the 1943 season.

Coach Page used practically two complete teams during the season thus giving many of the boys an opportunity to win the coveted "L" for which they put in many long hours of hard work. Those boys receiving letters are listed below. As there is not sufficient space to tell something about each player, only the seniors will be treated in such a manner.

TED DAILY—right halfback—Ted was a triple-threat bugaboo for all rival teams this season. His shifty backfield running, left handed passes and spiral punts always kept Lebanon in enemy territory. The hardest tackles of the year were made by Ted, and the opponents knew it when he smacked them. He scored 27 points.

DALTON JOHNSON—fullback—A real triple-threat player on any ball club. A boy who never knew when to stop after being tackled, Dalt could run the ends, fire a pass downfield, or plunge through the line, all with equal ability. He was high point man with 31 points.

CAL JENNINGS—quarterback—A three year letterman and one of the hardest tacklers and blockers for his size seen on the gridiron this year. A boy who always gave everything he had for the good of the team, he was a good team leader. He scored 6 points this year.

AL JENNINGS—left halfback—Alternated at left half and fullback and was very versatile at both positions. Al was always good for three or four yards, through the line, and it was his blocking that opened the way for many long runs. He scored I point this season.

CHUCK ENSLEY—back—He seemed always to be jinxed with injuries but he still gave all he had when he was in the ball game. Chuck could play any position in the backfield and gave a good account of himself at each one.

BILL MANELA—left end—Bill played the end position like a veteran although it was his first year in varisty competition. His pass catching ability and defensive smartness made him one of the best ends Lebanon has seen for a number of years. He was also a drop kicker of great ability, an art seldom seen on teams these days. He scored 1 point.

DEB FENNELL—left tackle—Opponents found Deb almost impossible to move on the defense and he often spilled ball carriers far back of the line of scrimmage. His blocking in the line opened big holes for the back to slip through for good gains.

REID MERITT—guard—A small fellow, but still one of the toughtest boys on the squad to keep out of a play. He was very fast and aggressive.

HAROLD HARDEN—right guard—Harold was always in there fighting every minute he was in the game and he never knew when to give up. This was his first year as a regular but he came through in great style.
