Tom Sawyer and his lazy, tough pal, Huckleberry Finn were up to their old pranks Friday, May 2, 1947, when the Senior Class of Lebanon presented its class play at the high school gym under the direction of Kee Buchanan Groves, (a veteran of many dramatic wars.)

There you discovered Tom trading off chances to help white-wash the fence; you were amused in Tom's pride in the plans for his own funeral; you enjoyed Huck's antipathy to shoes and soap and water; you wanted to cuff Sid, the smarty; you were enchanted as Tom was with his new girl friend, Becky Thatcher; and a bit sympathetic with the old one, Amy, with he sauciness and her lisp.

The exasperating scamp, Tom Sawyer, was played by Remmal Nivens. His partner in mischief, no-count Huck Finn, was well interpreted by Leon Kambak. Jean Burns as the sharp-tongued, soft hearted Aunt Polly, had a major role in the play. Whitey Opdyke played with relish, the part of Sid, the smoothy, Tom's brother, who was always tattling on him. Patsy Nelson, Tom's sweetheart, was a fetching lass, and it is easy to understand Tom's subjugation to her charms. Amy, the "past" in Tom's life, a smart little piece, with a tart charm of her own, was played by Marlys Sinclair. Paul Alley as the school teacher, and Mary Gene Gregory, his girl, supplied some old-fashioned love scenes. Elmer Fields was that rugged character, Indian Joe. Joe and "Tough" other friends of Tom and Huck's timeless partnership, were played by Delvan Miles and Glen Crossan. The mothers of these rascals and some neighbor women were: Mrs. Douglas, Alice L. Reck; Mrs. Harper, Oma White; Mrs. Crass, Margaret Howe; Mrs. Thatcher, Ramona Edwards. Miss Marsh, a teacher, was Eloise Groves. Her school children were:

On September 9, 1935, fifty-three excited first graders enrolled at Queen Anne Grade Schooi. Of the 102 seniors at the first of this year, Diana Edes, Ramona Edwards, Eloise Groves, Margaret Howe, Joan Humphreys, Betty Loft, Phyllis Loft, Dona Preston, Arden Keebler, Claribel Turner, Barbara Sherfy, Shirley Spires, and Dale Stewart were the only members of that original class. En route to the top, the class has welcomed many outstanding and progressive members.

Once more, on September 20, 1943, we found ourselves playing the parts of "greenhorns" as 157 freshmen began their prosperous careers at Lebanon High. We started the year happy over the fact that there was no official initiation. The class was fortunate in having its share of musicians, athletes, and leaders. Elected officers were president, Paul Alley; vice president, Melba Cox; secretary, Pat Canaga; treasurer, Dale Stewart; representative, Hugh Logan; and sergeant-at-arms, Carl Fox.

The year 1944 welcomed the uncouth freshmen back as sophisticated sophomores. Under the advisorship of Mrs. Christine Smith and Mrs. Jean Parham, the following officers were elected: president, Charles Gram; vice president, Ron Cox; secretary, Mary Gene Gregory; treasurer, Bob Downing; sergeant-at-arms, Paul Alley; and representative, Judy Swanson. This year was most successful with a St. Patrick's day party and a skating trip to Albany.

Under the leadership of president, Bud Goold; vice president, Leon Kambak; secretary, Marlys Sinclair; treasurer, Paul Alley; representative, Mary Gene Gregory; sergeant-at-arms, Wilson Vanderburg; and advisors, Mrs. Christine Smith, Mrs. Sterling Smith, and Miss Dougherty, we had a wonderful year. Again, as in former years, many of the boys were outstanding in sports with the girls entering that field through yell leader, Fay Carroll and rally squad members, Marion LeBaron, Fayne Blackburn, and Pat Woriand. In the field of music, we were very proud of Dick Hobbs who received a " 1 " rating in the district music contest.

This year for the first time, the junior class was represented on the annual staff by associate editor, Leon Kambak, and associate business manager, Judy Swanson.

With Mary Gene Gregory as chairman, the class produced the lovely JuniorSenior Prom, "Blossomtime." Harmonizing with the theme was Queen Ramona and her six princesses, Fay Carroll, Patsy Nelson, Mary Gene Gregory, Margaret Howe, Fayne B'ackburn, and Pat Wor'and.

In September, 1946, when we started our senior year, it was difficult to realize this was the last time we would take up our books and begin a new year at L. H. S. With this in mind, we were determined to make this year the best possible.

The most popular event of the year was the senior play, "Tom Sawyer," which was presented under the able direction of Kee Buchanan Groves. The play was given May 1 and 2 to a record breaking audience.

This year, Marlys Sinclair, who was the only Lebanon entry, won the district contest in poetry reading at Willamette University in Salem.

At the regional music contest, Dick Hobbs received a "1" rating and Eloise Groves a "2." Dick went to Ellensburg, Washington to the national contest to receive a " 2 " rating.
