February 26 was the date for this successful three-act comedy centered around a group of college girls attending Brier Mountain College for Women, who discover a proverbial "sofa snake" in their dormitory room one evening - a man! This brave young gentleman, in order not to be discovered in these sacred surroundings into which he was sent by fraternity brothers, takes on the disguise of a girl, hence the title of "Miss Jimmy."

Preparations for this annual event started six weeks before the proposed date of presentation with tryouts and casting. The turnout of girls for tryouts was wonderful, but the fellas must have been a little shy for their representation was comparatively small. After two days of reading this part and that part, the notice of the cast went up on the bulletin board reading as follows: Louise, Anne Swanson; Flo, Elizabeth Waddell; Doris, Irma Crockett; Kitty, Marjorie Kimble; Harriet, Velma Hinman; Droopy, Harry Drapela; Jimmy, J. T. Hamilton; Miss Watkins, Lucille Baertlein, and Professor Frazier, Dean Johnson. Then the real work started - five and a half weeks of nightly rehearsals. Reading, blocking, memorizing; painting, costuming, collecting furniture and hand props, and the many other duties which have to be done was the program in Room 9 and on the stage for six weeks during January and February. One of the rehearsal highlights took place a couple of Sundays before presentation when the cast held a potluck dinner in the Home Ec. building between the afternoon and evening rehearsals. The food which was brought out was fit for the opening night cast of the biggest production on Broadway.

This first dramatic experience for the class of ' 48 ended with the cries of "well done" and they were well deserved.

This year, for the first time, we were represented on the annual staff by Associate Editor Tom Juza and Associate Business Manager Elizabeth Waddell.

The Prom, with its theme "Blue Moon" and Queen Norma Bodtke reigning over her court of six lovely princesses, Jean Russell, Mary K. Reeves, Nancy Trigg, Doris Neustel, Dorothy Neustel and Joanne Warner, was the climaxing event of our Junior year.

Several students, Lester Simons, Elizabeth Waddell, Mary K. Reeves, Jean Russell and Nancy Trigg received " 1 " ratings at the district music contest entitling them to go to Ellensburg, where Lester Simons received the only " 1 " rating.

On September 15, 1947, we were on the last lap in our high school education. Officers were: president, J. T. Hamilton; vice president, Bob Henkle; secretary, Orvillis Pepperling; treasurer, Sharlee Leach.

In sports Bob Henkle was chosen for the all-state football team and received a silver football for his selection on the tri-county all-star team.

Lester Simons and Harry Drapela received " 1 " and " 2 " ratings respectively at the district contest. Others contributed a large share to the band in helping it achieve a " 1 " rating at the state contest.

Eileen Norman was elected to represent L. U. H. S. at the annual Strawberry Fair.
