Student Body Council

This year the Associated Student Body of Lebanon Union High School has had a very successful year under the leadership of the 1950-51 officers: president, Wally De-Kuyper; vice-president, Dick Lewis; secretary, Betty Anne Lindley; treasurer, Beverly Canoy. The duties of the officers and the council are to govern the student body in a democratic way. This year, the 43 members with the aid of Mr. Cash and Mr. Page, have done an excellent job.

This year there was an amendment to the Student Body constitution. It is as follows: "Article 4, Section 1, shall read: The student governing body shall be composed of two

groups: the presidium and the council.

"The council shall consist of the elected or appointed student official, a representative from each active club, president of each class and the representative of each class, who shall be elected on the basis of one representative for each 75 members or fraction over 50. No class shall have less than one representative. The student-body vice-president shall preside over this council and the student body secretary shall be the secretary of this body.

"The presidium shall consist of the class presidents and the president of the student body. The student body president shall preside and the secretary of the student body

shall be the non-voting secretary of this body.

"The principal or his deputy shall act as advisor for each of these groups.

Section 2 shall read: "The duties of the presidium shall be: To convene the council; to draw up the budget for the association; take any steps necessary for the well-being of the association; make all necessary committee appointments and nominations; execute the commands of the student body.

Any measure not passed by the unanimous approval of the presidium must be submitted to the council for ratification.

Any measure passed by the unanimous consent of the presidium may by a twothirds vote of the council be annulled.

The freshmen have enjoyed their first year of high school very much and are looking forward to their sophomore year.



We, the 8th grade class of '51 feel that we have played an important part in rounding out the school year, and we hope to play a larger part next year.







May 10 marked the second initiation at which 11 new members were taken in.


This year the Thespians are trying to get letters for the people who have 10 or more points. They would like to get a blue "L" with "Drama," inscribed on it, and get white sweaters.

A "Cotton and Cords" dance held in the evening in honor of Queen Joyce I and her court ended the day of festivities.







Although the Lebanon Jayvees won only one game out of six, that doesn't tell the story of their success. They lost two of the games in the last few minutes, and by one point.





Track
