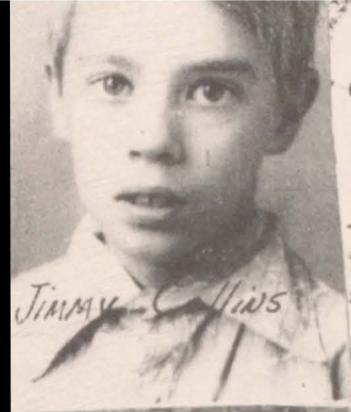
Many things rappeden during rehearsals, like the time they used grass for the tea party and it would come out the spout of the teapot. It would really break the mood and everyone would get out of character.

On Valentine's Day the club had its annual party for the members. This date was also the seventh anniversary of the club. Dancing and games were enjoyed by all who attended.

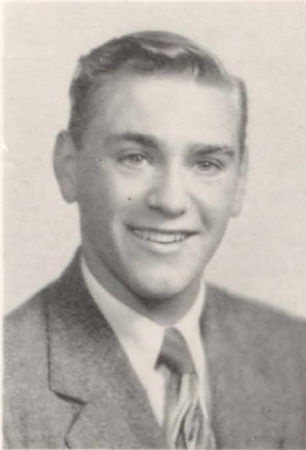

9th Grade Basketball

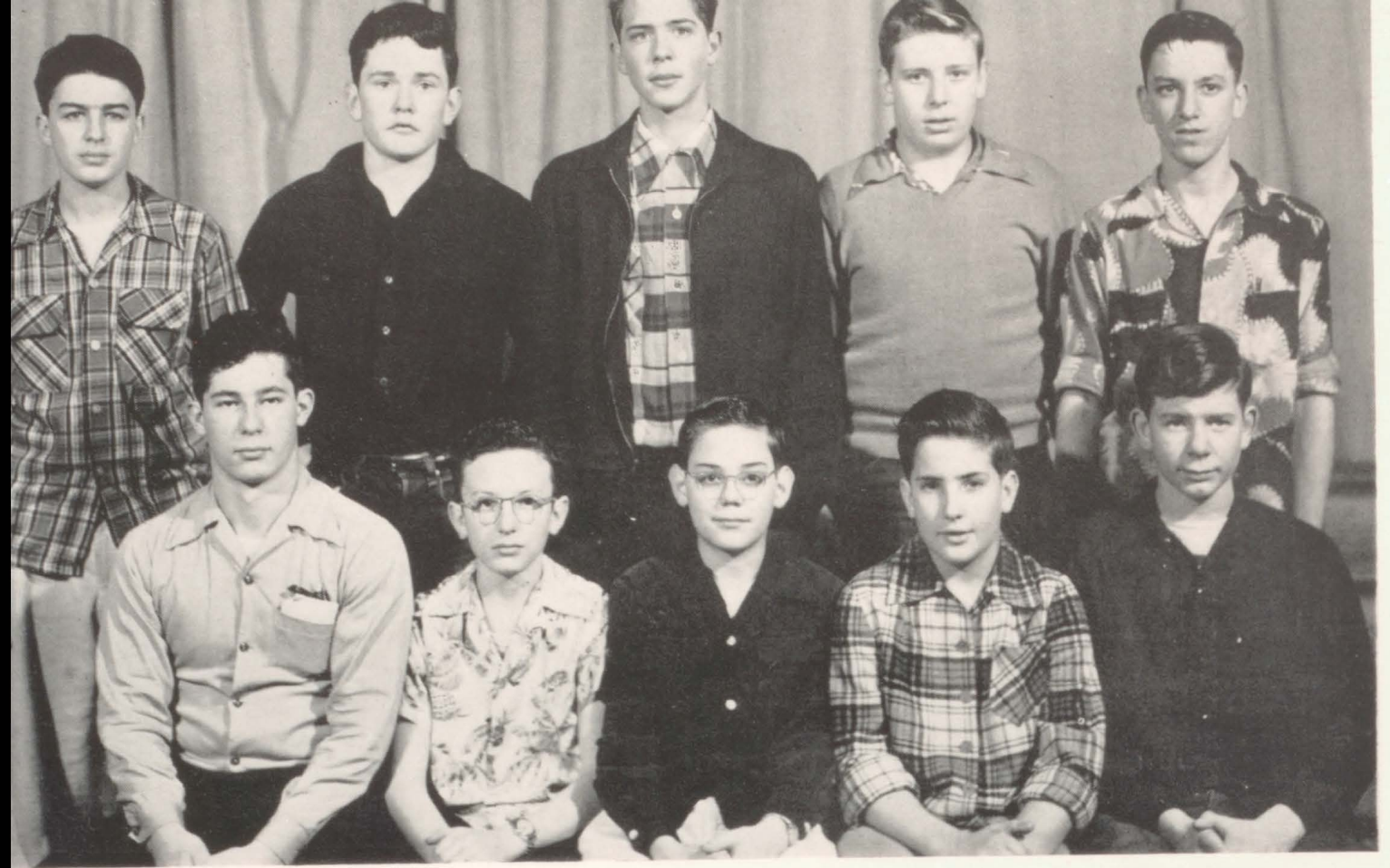
Mr. Anderson's 9th Grade team had an unfavorable 1951-1952 season as they lost both games they had scheduled to end up with a 0 win 2 loss record.
