Uncertain Wings was our Senior Class Play. The lead roles were taken by Joanna Moore, Carolee McCready, and Don Gilbert.



Our Junior princess, Darlene Edwards, was chosen Queen at the "Sweetheart Dance" held in the Gym, February 12th.



The latest enrollment of the class was 210.



Three of the "B" squad yell leaders were freshmen: Jackie Daily, Janice Brown, and Marcia Davis.



The freshmen girls sold the most candy for the Girls' League sale.


None of us will forget kids like Vivian Lyons. Remember when she bought a ticket for a reserved seat in the cafeteria?

After several weeks of practice and confusion of learning plays, our Warriors traveled to Dallas and returned with the first scalp of the season, defeating the Dragons to the tune of 15 to 6. A very happy Lebanon squad had won their first opening football game since 1949, when they beat Newport, 13 to 6.

The Warrior gridmen turned in another sterling performance in the second game of the season, downing a tough Albany eleven, 25 to 18 on the Newport field. This game would have been the highlight of any football game in the state. Our Warriors were behind, 18 to 6 at the half, but the Bulldogs didn't figure on the fighting spirit of Lebanon. Lebanon came back on the field and ended the game by holding Albany scoreless and scoring three touchdowns for our own cause.

Hopes were high as Lebanon came onto the field to take on the Corvallis High gridmen. Lebanon outplayed the Spartans all through the game but two blocked punts in the end zone ruined Lebanon's chances for victory. Final score — Lebanon, 21; Corvallis, 27.

Lebanon got back into the win column after the Corvallis heart-breaker by downing Redmond 6 to 0 on the Redmond field.

The following week, Lebanon trampled the Central Union Panthers, 35 to 0 on the Lebanon field. The Warriors allowed the Panthers only one first down.

Lebanon stayed in the win column with a 19-18 victory over the Bend Lava Bears on the Bend gridiron.

Lebanon crushed the Sweet Home Huskies, 20 to 0 the next week. The Huskies were "up" for this game against their ace rival and held the Warriors to a score of 7-0 at half-time but couldn't cope with the fine Lebanon spirit and allowed two more touchdowns in the fourth period.

In the Salem game, nothing seemed to go right for our gridiron men and it seemed that the Vikings could do nothing wrong. Final score — Lebanon, 7; Salem, 42.

The Lebanon football team came out onto the field with "blood in their eyes" the following week and ended the season with a 19 to 7 win over the Cottage Grove Lions. The Warriors ended the season in a second place tie in the district.

To end the season, Joe Sprague was chosen to represent Lebanon in the All-State Shriners game in Portland. Joe was also chosen all-state guard by all of the coaches in the state. Henry Erdwins was chosen as an alternate tackle on the Shriners All-State team. Other members of our team were chosen "All District."

Those graduating are: Joe Sprague, fullback; Don Scheler, guard; Henry Erdwins, tackle; Murvel Stone, end; Ron Hammer, tackle; J. D. Griffith, end; Bob Wilson, line-backer; Larry Crenshaw, tackle; Laurence Lindsey, guard; and Vic Dixon, quarterback.

Returning lettermen are: Darrell Fort, center; Monte Seigner, tackle; Dick White, half-back; Tyler Cone, guard; Larry Hoover, guard; Malcolm McBride, half-back; Roger Wold, guard; Lee Evans, guard; Charlie Pless, half-back; Ed Neustel, end; Jim Smith, half-back; Darryl Bishop, quarterback, and Benny Monroe, half-back.

With all of these returning lettermen plus our fine coaching staff, we, the students of Lebanon Union High School, can feel assured of a good team next year and the years that follow.

Wrestling

Wrestling at Lebanon High School is rapidly becoming one of the school's major sports. This year wrestling has had its most successful year since it was started five years ago under the able leadership of Coach Murle Wells.

The team's record as far as wins were concerned was ten out of twelve matches won. The only two matches lost was one to Klamath Falls, this year's state wrestling champs, and one to Albany. The Lebanon matmen later came back and scored an upset victory over Albany to gain revenge and snap a twenty-two match winning streak

that the Bulldogs were riding on.

The Warrior grapplers then went on to gain local fame by snatching a district championship, the first district wrestling championship Lebanon had ever won. Of the possible twenty-four berths to the state tournament in district, the Warriors took twelve, six championships and six runner-up berths. The district champs from Lebanon were Ivan Winningham, 106 lbs.; Jim Beaton, 124 lbs.; Carol Lindsey, 136 lbs.; J. D. Griffith, 141 lbs.; Lyle Larson, 156 lbs.; and Lee Evans, 165 lbs. Those taking second place were Gary Parks, 98 lbs.; Bob Durham, 115 lbs.; Francis Lee, 124 lbs.; Lee Malick, 136 lbs.; Melvin Darby, 165 lbs., and Joe Sprague, 177 lbs.

These Lebanon boys then went on to give Lebanon state-wide fame by placing our school fifth out of approximately 40 schools represented in the State Wrestling Tournament at Corvallis.. Lebanon was narrowly edged out for fourth place by one point by

Roseburg.

The Warrior grapplers who placed in the state tournament were, Ivan Winningham who made an excellent showing in the state tournament and placed second in the 106 lb. weight division; Lee Evans who lost his first match of the year to defending state champion, a senior from Molalla, by a close margin and gained second place in the 165 lb. weight division; and Joe Sprague who took fourth in the 177 lb. weight division.

Lebanon's prospect for one of the best wrestling teams in the state next year are very good. This year only five seniors graduate. Next year should be the year in which Coach Murle Wells will shape up the best wrestling team that Lebanon has ever seen.


