Other games were lost to Albany, Scio, Sweet Home, North Salem, and South Salem. The real highlight of the year was with Albany who had been rated as a good " $B$ " team. Lebanon founght to a standstill battle with them until the last quarter when Albany managed to squeeze over a lone touchdown and win 13 to 7.

Some of the outstanding players were Don Allen, Gary Yates, Jack Gatchell, Bud Miller, Joe Miller, Jim Nicholas, Jim Griffith, Dale Tewalt, Pete Bishop, and Ray Wold, These boys will undoubtedly help the " $A$ " squad in future years.

The year 1954-55 not only was the last game for 15 Warrior gridmen, but it also marked the last season at Lebanon High for the coach, George Van Pelt. Van Pelt was deeply admired not only by his team, but also by his associates on the coaching staff. We all regret to see "George" leave and know that he will be hard to replace, in both character and coaching ability.

The Warrior footballers opened the season in the mud at Astoria and nipped the Fishermen 6-0 on the strength of a first quarter touchdown by Malcolm McBride.

In their second game of the year, the Warriors rolled over Dallas 19 to 0 at Lebanon. McBride led the assault with two touchdowns. White, the little scatback, scored on a 62 yard jaunt off tackle.

The Warriors had their first defeat of the year hung on them Sept. 24 by the Corvallis Spartans at Lebanon to the tune of $6-0$. This was a heartbreaker for the Warriors who battled so gamely with the sturdy Sparts who later tied with the state champs, South Salem.

Following the Corvallis tilt, the Warriors, after leading Albany 7 to 0 at the half, fell apart in the last two cantos and lost to the offensive-minded Bulldogs, 18-7.

Darrell Fort, Warrior center, sparkled on defense, blocking two punts.
On October 8, Van Pelt's boys hit the win column again by edging the North Salem Vikings $7-6$ at Lebanon. Ron Bessonette tallied the Warriors' only T.D.

The Warrior-Saxon battle was the game in which Lebanon lost the services of outstanding halfback, Dick White, who had averaged 8.5 yards per carry rushing prior to the contest. The Warriors lost the game to the state champion Saxons 34 to 13 .

October 22, the Warriors lost their fourth game of the year to the Bend Lava Bears, 6 to 0 at Lebanon. Bend picked their lone tally in the second quarter. Fort, Siegner, and Cone looked good on defense for the Warriors.

Lebanon quickly retaliated from the Bend defeat by stomping Sweet Home 27 to 6 at Sweet Home. Bessonette paced the Warrior attack by blasting his way 73 yards to the T.D. that set the Warriors off flying. McBride scored two Warrior touchdowns while Darryl Bishop scored the final sixer on a pass reception. Defensively, Roger Wold, Nick Nicholas, Monte Siegner, and Fort turned in superb performances for Lebanon.

The Warrior eleven capped off the season by coming from behind in the fourth quarter to beat Cottage Grove 13 to 7 on November 5 at Cottage Grove. The Warriors were spear-headed by backs Bessonette and McBride. Defensive-wise, Lebanon's Siegner and Wold proved very tough customers. Fifteen Warriors have played their final football game for L. U. H. S. They are as follows: Filcher, Nicholas, Pless, Schroeder, Bishop, Gatchell, Leisy, Beaton, Holland, Williams, McBride, Neustel, Fort, Bessonette, and Seigner.

When the season drew to a close, the Warriors proved that they could play ball with the best teams in the state.

## "A"Basketball

Lebanon Union High School's basketball team completed their 1954-55 cage campaign with a shoddy seven won-fifteen lost record for the year. The Warriors, coached by Bob Kane, nabbed wins over Junction City twice, Willamette twice, Burns, McMinnville, and Sweet Home.

The rangy Warriors started their season off in fine fashion by nipping Junction Ctiy 47 to 46 at Lebanon before getting dumped by the Dallas Dragons, 46-44.

In the third game of the year, the Warriors rapped the McMinnville Grizzlies 66-57 behind the great shooting of Malcolm McBride, Don Carroll, and Monte Siegner, who scored 18, 16, and 13 points in that order.

The Warriors then dropped a pair of games in a row to Astoria and Seaside. The Warrior "guns" were Carroll and McBride who scored 20 and 24 points in respective contests.

The following week, the Warriors, behind a 15 point performance by McBride, topped the Willamette Wolverines, 53 to 43.

The Warriors lost their fourth game of the year to the Dallas Dragons, 50-39 in a sloppily played scramble at Dallas.

Bob Kane's Warriors then bounced right back with decisive wins over Burns and Willamette. The Warriors topped Burns 63 to 50 and Willamette 61 to 36. McBride and Siegner topped the club in scoring for the two games with 35 and 24 points apiece.

Then came a dry spell for the Warriors. They lost the next five games in a row to Sweet Home, Corvallis, North Salem, O. C. E. Frosh, and Albany.

Arch rival Sweet Home tripped up the Warriors 41 to 34 at Lebanon in a slowmoving contest. Corvallis bounced the Warriors 54-49. The Warriors, getting some excellent shooting out of McBride, Carroll, and Neustel, were in the game all of the way but just couldn't quite seem to catch up. Big Mac topped Lebanon scoring with 15 counters.

North Salem then humiliated the Warriors to the tune of 68-46.
Against the O. C. E. Frosh, the Warriors battled gamely and on even terms with the college boys but didn't quite have the fine touch it takes to win as they went by the wayside 41 to 39 . McBride was a thorn in the side of the Frosh all evening long as he hung up 20 points to top all scorers.

Albany followed the Frosh by mangling the Warriors 65 to 34 in a runaway at Lebanon.

Finally, the loss skein was broken as McBride and Neustel engineered a 47 to 46 win over Junction City.

After the J. C. game, the Warriors hit another slump and lost their next six games in a row before closing out the season with a thrilling victory over Sweet Home. The string of setbacks started as the Corvallis Spartans rode to a $54-51$ triumph over the Warriors. Coach Earl Gerfen's thinclads completed a muddy 1955 track season as they won three dual meets, a four-way meet, and the Corvallis relays as compared to a lone dual meet loss to South Salem.

The Warriors placed third in district and sent four men to the state finals at Corvallis. The Warriors participating at the state meet were Malcolm McBride, Monte Siegner, Ron Bessonette, and Roger Wold.

McBride competed in the 120 yard high hurdles and the broad-jump, while Bessonette took part in the 440 yard dash. These two boys, plus Siegner and Wold, combined to make up the Warrior's strong relay team. McBride and Bessonette were both district champions.

The Warriors registered wins over Corvallis, $752 / 3$ to $461 / 3$; Sweet Home, twice, 82 to 40 and $861 / 2$ to $321 / 2$. They won the Corvallis Relays by garnering $751 / 2$ points as compared to the nearest rival, Corvallis with $39 \frac{1}{2}$. They won a quadrangular meet over Central, Stayton, and Dallas by racking up $893 / 4$ points.

Individually it was McBride, Bessonette, and Siegner who paved the way for most of the Warrior victories. McBride led the trio as he won every event he participated in with the exception of one during the regular season. McBride was topped in the broadjump by teammate Richard Baldwin in the last meet of the season.

McBride also turned in one of the most outstanding individual performances in the state this year as he tallied six firsts in a four team meet at Central of Monmouth. He took top honors in the low and high hurdles, broad-jump, high jump, 220, and the 100 yard dash.

Bessonette proved to be a consistent performer this year as he rolled to win after win in the 440 yard dash in which he placed first in every Warrior meet up to the state finals.

Reliable Monte Siegner came through in nearly every Warrior meet this year with double wins in the shot put and discus.

There were three school records broken this year by Warrior runners and field men. Tall Ed Erikson broke his own school record in the javelin as he tossed the spear $159^{\prime} 5^{\prime \prime}$. Junior Kenny Place cracked the pole vault record by soaring over the 11 foot mark. McBride, already holder of two school records, set another as he broadjumped $21^{\prime} 21^{\prime \prime} 4^{\prime \prime}$ in the district finals at Albany.

The Warriors will be losing eight of this year's twelve lettermen. The letter award winners are McBride, Siegner, Erikson, Bessonette, Gatchell, Langmack, Stitt, Wold, Snyder, Place, Baldwin, and freshman Les Stevahn. Returning lettermen will be Place, Snyder, Baldwin, and Stevahn.

The J. V. track team, also had an exceptionally good year, while winning the majority of their meets.

With these returning lettermen and the boys who will be coming up from the Junior Varsity, Lebanon can look to good future track teams.

Coaches for the year were: Mr. Gerfen, Mr. Reynolds and Mr. Van Pelt. These men worked hard to produce one of the best teams in the history of the school.


## Baseball

Coach Joe Hellberg's Lebanon Union High School baseball nine to date have won one game and lost four in district competition. The lone Warrior win of the year was over Sweet Home, 5 to 4, at Sweet Home.

The Warriors certainly did not lack in lettermen this year as they had 11 veterans from last year's club that won 3 and lost 11

The lettermen were Wayne Lamphere, Dave Kemp, Ed Neustal, Darryl Bishop, Benny Monroe, Ray Pilcher, Jerry Morrow, Don Carroll, Larry Hoover, Jim Hayden, and transfer first baseman Phil Schroeder.

The Warriors' schedule was very limited this year due to the weather conditions. Instead of playing each district team twice the Warriors had to settle for one nineinning game with each team. All other district teams had to abide by the same rule.

Lebanon's only win came early in the year as they downed Sweet Home 5 to 4. The Warriors had to battle from behind to stop the Huskies in the extra inning clash. They had meets with such teams as Corvallis, Albany, Eugene, and Stayton.
Although the team did not have such a good season, cross country is a coming sport in Lebanon.

## Intramurals

The intramural program has been dominated by the class of 1955. They began their march last fall by defeating all opposition in touch football. The final game of the season proved to be their toughest. The Juniors held them to a 0-0 score, but the Seniors won by piling up the most yardage.

In basketball two senior teams tied with a junior team for first place in a closely fought race. Each team won seven games while losing three.

The following boys are the intramural wrestling champions in their weights: Tommy Lee, Ron Train, Russ Canaga, David Hatton, Darrell Kauffman, and Malcolm McBride.

Arnold Bice and Benny Plymale were the two boys who played off for the intramural ping-pong championship with Bice edging Plymale in a very close score in two out of three matches.

Softball has been stymied this spring because of the bad weather which we have been having.

Dick Anderson is the leading individual scorer with 220 points, closely followed by Don Beaton, who has collected 210; Arnold Bice then follows with 180 points. All three of these boys are seniors.

The senior class dominates the class scoring by having more than twice as many points as the nearest rival, the juniors. The seniors have 2810, juniors 1330, sophomores 1225, freshmen 1010.
