High grade honors for the four years went to Toni Wilson, Valedictorian, and Marilyn Swanson, Salutatorian.





We want to congratulate all the Junior boys who participated in athletics.




Warriorettes chosen from the sophomore class were Karen Johnson, Charolette Jacobs, Judy Mitchell, and Debbie Kingan.

Our class advisors this year have been Mrs. Janke, Miss Carter, Mr. Parham, and Mr. Hodson.



Kay Parker was selected as Homecoming Princess for the Freshman Class.







Another evening meeting was held at Miriam Brown's home. The program of the evening was the showing of Miriam's pictures from England.



The day was climaxed by a cotton and cords dance held at the Elks Temple honoring the May Court and the Elks Student City Officials.







Team work was quite evident but poor shooting percentage proved to be a huge obstacle.


At the close of the season the members of the squad voted on the outstanding player and also voted on the boy that had been the most inspirational.



Track

Coach Earl Gerfen's thinclads finished their season with a three win, four loss record. The Warriors were triumphant over Central and Dallas in a triangular meet, and defeated Sweet Home and Dallas once each in dual competition.

The May Day track meet proved to be Lebanon's undoing. Sweet Home recovered from their earlier defeat by the Warriors and retaliated with a scoree that won them the Elk's May Day Trophy. This was the same trophy Lebanon had held the two previous years.

The team was hurt this year by the lack of experienced runners. Only three returning lettermen were boasted, two seniors and one sophomore. The seniors were Ken Place and Richard Baldwin, and the sophomore was Les Stevahn.

The only individual school record set this year in varsity competition was by team captain, Ken Place, in the pole vault. Ken first topped the old mark seet last year in the May Day track meet with a jump of 11'. The most outstanding performer on the team was probably the sophomore flash, Les Stevahn. Les consistently scored against opponents in the century, 220 yard dash, shot put, and the discus.

In district competition the Warrior thinclads were only able to defeat Sweet Home for sixth place. Top scorer for Lebanon was junior, Kent Wilcox, who ran a 4:45.8 mile to place third. Others placing were Jon Pattinson, freshman star, with a fourth place in the shot put, and Dalton Plunkett and Ken Place with a tie for fourth in pole vaulting. In the low hurdles, George Cobat placed sixth, as did Place in the broad jump.

Although the season was very unsuccessful in the win-loss column, it proved to be a very good season for building up the team and getting the much needed experience for the underclassmen.


There weer three seniors, four juniors, four sophomores, and two freshmen on the team this year.
