## LIBERTY BELL

The liberty bell hung in the cupola above the old Santiam Academy and was brought around Cape Horn in 1862. It was used to call students of the Academy to classes for many years and it tolled the death of Abraham Lincoln in 1865. When the Academy was torn down in 1936, the bell hung in the old high school building. It was then used to smnounce victories of sports events and became known as the Victory Bell. During the remodeling of the high school building, the bell was stored in the machine shop. It remained silent for several years until the Hi-Y sponsored many different activities to collect money to put the bell on wheels so it could be heard again.

The student council consists of the executive officers of the student body, the representatives of each class, the president of Girls' and Boys' League and the representatives of the Inter-Activity Council. Its purpose is to execute the wishes of the students, to represent them in all matters of student concern and to assist the administration in determining school policies.

The 1963-1964 student council first formulated a committee to check on student attendance at the assemblies. Also, each month students were appointed to fill out evaluation sheets to help evaluate the assemblies for their worth and audience reaction.

The balance of the money, donated through I.A.C. to the Whitehill fund for an Albany athlete, was donated by student council; a check was sent for the total sum. The students were asked to bring toys for the Christmas project to help the children in the area. The toys were then taken to the Willamette Valley Rehabilitation Center.

An experimental program of students giving the morning and afternoon announcemets was put into effect. It was hoped that this might better receive the attention of the students.

The Inter-Activity Council consists of the presidents or representatives of each of the school's twenty-four clubs. Its purpose is to discuss school problems and to consider suggestions and grievances presented by the clubs.

The IAC is a very powerful and important organization in that it has indirect control over the fifty per cent of the student body belonging to clubs. It is through IAC that major school problems are brought to the attention of the students and the role of student responsibility is strengthened.

The council has participated in several activities this year which have aided the improvement of school affairs. A clean-up campaign and concession stand probation period were instigated early in the year to insure neat halls and lockers. This problem has remained under the continual surveillance of the council. The idea of announcements given by students originated in IAC with occasional student appeals concerning such things as clean-up campaigns and hall discipline. At the present time, all announcements are given by members of the student body: The plan of contributing to the Whitehill fund also originated in IAC, and proved to be a very rewarding project.

There are certain duties about school which are the sole responsibility of the IAC. The Firesquad, working through IAC, annually paints dividing lines in the student parking lot. The Council is in charge of buying records and providing music for dances and during lunch hour. A music committee has been chosen from IAC members specifically for this purpose. In addition to attending to its own duties, the council often makes recommendations to Student Council concerning basic school policies.

Under the able leadership of Steve Simpson and the guidance of Mr. Page, the Inter-Activity Council has accomplished much for the improvement of school affairs.
