Lebanon's vocational education program is one of the very best in the state of Oregon. It consists of home economics courses, drivers' education, shop classes, and agriculture. The program takes pride in itself in the fact that it covers such a wide area of subjects.
Home economics, taught on many different levels, covers sewing, cooking, flower arranging, table setting, serving, baby sitting, child care, personal grooming, and how to run a household. Such classes are helpful to many girls in broadening their knowledge in this area.
Driver education is a very valuable course for young, beginning drivers. Mr. Dixon and Mr. Fritz teach many students the fundamentals of driving through class study and actual driving.
Lebanon has very fine auto, metal, and wood shop facilities. Many specialized metal working machines, such as lathes, milling machines, and welders, are available for our boys to learn how to operate. The auto shop is equipped with car motors and students' cars for the classes to work with. In wood shop beginning students build foot stools and other woodworking articles. Advanced classes work with lathes and drill presses to produce fine workmanship. Lebanon students have an opportunity unequal to almost all other high school students to get basic and somewhat advanced training in this vocational area.
A fairly new program introduced at Lebanon is that of agriculture. Just this year a new building was added on to the shop area for these
classes. Also, this department has an experiment land laboratory where students can put their knowledge to work. Specific classes offered are as follows: agriculture principles, agriculture production, agriculture mechanics, horticulture, farm operation and management, and forestry. Lebanon has a vocational program that all can be proud of.

## Business



Lebanon High School can boast one of the finest business departments in the state. Students can receive very competent training in this area by taking such courses as typing, shorthand, accounting, stenographic procedures, and many others. Classes learn to use the key punch which makes IBM cards for computers. Also, machine shorthand has recently been introduced. Here a small, silent machine can record any words in the English language by the use of just a few keys. Adding machines of all sorts are employed to learn the procedure of making payrolls and other company business. One direct advantage derived from this type of study is after school jobs for many Lebanon students. Also, with such secretarial training, jobs are easier to obtain after the completion of high school.

A program of nurses' training is provided for girls interested in pursuing the field of nursing. They receive on-the-job training under the supervision of the school nurse, and they assist the nurse with many of her tasks.
