School closures due to snow, graduation requirements, and student discipline were a few of the tasks handled by them. ## School Board



One of the major concerns of the school board was the conservation of fuel. Christmas vacation was extended three days by a unanimous vote of the board, giving students two weeks of leisure. This decision, due to the energy crisis, was made in an effort to cut down on oil used to heat the building because of difficulty in receiving the necessary oil supply. Upon returning to school, classroom temperatures were lowered to 680 . Cancellation of all activity and rally buses followed this action. Field trips were restricted and only necessary activities were scheduled because of the uncertaintly of gas allocations.

Many of the courses offered operated under the appearance of actual working conditions, thus providing an atmosphere of reality. The accounting classes used a Lester Hill simulation while the stenographic procedures class used a Georgia Pacific simulation.

## Guidance

## Math

When consumer math was added to the Math curriculum, juniors and seniors found it to be a practical application course. Fifty-three students learned, through house to house surveys, the consumer products that were most popular. They also learned how to battle inflation through the use of consumer protection tags and evaluated rising costs; thus developing an awareness of the value of comparitive shopping. With an eye to the future the class acquired knowledge on the aspects of financing and buying a car or home.

The Math department boasted classes for all levels of interest, from basic to trigonometry. Each student was grouped with others of similar abilities according to his actual classroom performance and the quality of his work.

## Physícal Education

Aside from freshman, sophomore, and junior participation in required Physical Education, a special elective course of P. E. was offered to seniors in the form of an assistant position to the class instructor This course provided training for prospective teachers in techniques of instruction and class control.

Previously, physical education classes were not co-educational and sport groupings were predetermined by the staff. An option was made available, however, to the students to merge boy and girl classes into co-educational units with sport selection privileges. Courses primarily taught for girls included field hockey, tumbling, floor exercise, recreational softball, badminton, archery, and self-defense. Taught predominantly for boys were wrestling, touch football, flashball, weight training, agility, speedball, and soccer. Both sexes were offered the remaining units of gymnastics, swimming, tennis, golf, bowling, volleyball, basketball, track and field and other outdoor activities; including jogging, hiking, and cycling.

The aim of the entire physical training program was to acquaint students with physical activities which keep the mind and body active and alert.

## Science

The science department, headed by Mr. Henry Burridge, consisted of IIS, IPS, biology I \& II, chemistry and physics. A new dimension was added to the curriculum in the form of a class, environmental science, which dealt with possible solutions to worldwide ecological problems. They worked to develop an understanding between the relationship of man's need of material goods and the preservation of the natural environment.

The year was highlighted for the science classes by field trips to the OSU and LBCC science departments to gain knowledge of programs.available in higher education. The study of ferns and analyzing of water pollutants were among projects that gave the students practical, first-hand experience in scientific operations.

## Social Studies

Sophomore history students were offered an alternative to the regular course content used in previous years. The Social Studies department gave each world history student a choice of three to five topics or events they might like to explore in depth. The instructor depended upon the subject chosen. This method proved to be worthwhile as the students could study a topic in which they were truly interested.

Current social, economic, and political problems of the world were examined in contemporary world problems, as an elective course. Important issues were studied in depth through newspapers and magazines, used as textbooks.

Three units of social studies, distributed throughout three years, were included in the graduation requirements. Worid history was essential to sophomores, United States history to juniors, and modern problems to seniors.

The vocational education department was rated as one of the finest in the state. It offered students an incentive to learn through the leadership of talented, knowledgeable instructors and the abundance of learning equipment. Mr. Charles Porfily, vocational director, coordinated the curriculum of the home economics, driver's education, health careers, and industrial departments.

Food services was offered to seniors interested in a career related to commercial cooking. Advanced food preparation and marketing were emphasized to establish a realistic overview of a career in the food industry.

For students interested in a medical or dental profession health services provided an atmosphere of realty. The first semester included a two hour classroom orientation while the second found students working in the hospital, ambulance, nursing homes, doctors' offices, or local pharmacies.

Lebanon's land lab, considered top in the state, prepared students for a farming occupation. Used for educational purposes, the lab taught proper animal care and nutrition.

Building construction had the opportunity to build a house. The initial plans were drawn up by drafting classes and the actual construction was performed by students under the direction of Mr. "Andy" Anderson. Extensive remodeling enabled new facilities to be added to the instructional resource center. A color television was purchased for educational purposes as were scanners for micro-film which allowed large amounts of material to be stored in a small area. In addition, the offset duplicator, a new means of printing, was made available for instructor use. The number of students who made use of the library facilities averaged 440 per day. The floor space of the library nearly tripled to house the additional equipment and assist students in locating materials with ease.

The audio-visual department, located in the south end of the instructional resource center, remodeled its interior and received additional equipment to replace that which was old or out-dated. The amount of equipment was further increased to meet the demand placed upon it by faculty members. Mr. Marshall Summers supervised the scheduling of all films and equipment to maintain both an efficient and essential department.

## Custodians

The custodians were responsible for maintaining the cleanliness of the gymnasium, halls and classrooms. On duty twenty-four hours a day their work was done quietly and efficiently when many of the students were elsewhere. However, during school hours they were found opening jammed lockers, repairing faulty thermostats, delivering supplies, or sweeping shattered glass. An example of their devotion and dependability was the fourty-eight hour continual operation of a pump to avoid flooding of the auditorium due to heavy rain.
