Research into their after-school hours showed that these dedicated students were changing their personalities to get into their parts for the Winter Play, "The Drunkard."
"The Drunkard," directed by Mrs. Susan Hamer with student director, Susan Salisbury, got off to a late start when rain and snow plagued the first week of rehearsals. But with the help of a few weekend rehearsals and sincere cast members, lost time was made up, and the play opened on schedule, February 13th through the 15th.

First performed in 1844 to aid the temperance movement, "The Drunkard's" performance here at LUHS aided the students in furthering their theatrical experience. The play was presented in the same manner as an old-fashioned melodrama, complete with Can-Can girls and Vaudeville Commediennes. The play centered around a well respected citizen who is caught in the clutches of villainous Lawyer Cribbs. As a result of his decline, his beloved family becomes destitute. When it appears that all is lost, Arden Rencelaw, a kindly exalcoholic, restores the "drunkard" to his loveable and respectable self and paints a picture of harmonious family happiness in the ending scene.

This year, the high school underwent some expansion with the addition of some new modular classrooms behind the English wing. One of these rooms serves a unique but important purpose. Equipped with sinks, work tables and lots of space, this room provides a "home base" for the Special Education Students who transferred here last fall from McDowell Creek School. The process is called "Mainstreaming," and what it really means is getting these special students involved in high school life.

Vie Carruth, Nancy Thomas and Linda Bart, the teachers of these special students, along with several student aids, work with the students and help them in anyway they can. The students are instructed on an individual basis but also participate in group projects, practicing skills that are worthwhile and rewarding.
