## Community Congress



A Public Town Hall meeting was held February 28 by the residents of Lebanon to determine what the future should be for the community.

Everyone was encouraged to join in the meetings, although only 86 of the expected 300 persons turned out.

It began at 9 a.m. After a bried explanation, those in attendance broke into smaller groups to discuss specific areas of interest - Education, Trade and Industry, Land Use Planning and Community Services. The survey results were discussed and resolutions were made to be voted on during the general meeting.

At 11:15, the panel chairman presented the resolutions from the morning discussions. The audience was given a chance to speak on the resolutions and a vote was taken.

The outcome was that Lebanon-Area residents wanted continuing growth of industry, and the establishment of an industrial park where new industries could locate. Suggestions included side walks be built in some parts of town. Highway 20 to be rerouted off main street, and school buildings be available for public use every day of the year.
