Very Soon you will be paying fees to take Drivers Ed, not to mention taking the course through CC. Driver Education will be cancelled at being taught through LUHS due to economic deficiencies. This year 109 students learned the responsibilities of the road through the course and received certificates showing they were responsible drivers. Mr. Soule supervised for his first year, as department head, and this year is his twentieth anniversary as a teacher at LUHS.

All P.E. classes including ninth and tenth grade P.E., leisure and active P.E., and weight training were all taught by Miss Jarvis (her first year teaching this area), also cheerleading supervisor. The Health Department taught freshman and juniors things such as personal improvement, sexuality, drugs, mental health, first aid, the exceptional child, health consumerism, diseases, and human reproduction. This area is taught by five separate teachers, which its goals are to teach the student better awareness of human functions and alert them as consumers.

The basic concept of the learning center is as follows: they work with students who have learning problems, assist with math and basic communications classes to meet graduation requirements and competencies in these areas; teacher vocational classes, work experience and living skills classes for students not meeting requirements for a regular diploma. Those classes prepare students for adult living and getting a job. The interpersonal skills class helps students understand themselves as people, and deal effectively with problems; speech and language therapy is provided for students with difficulty in expressive language; adaptive P.E. class which works with students on improving individual physical condition; and finally, the peer tutor program, which trains capable and responsible students to work with less capable students in content area classes. This provides one-to-one help with academics.
