winner.


















Pep Assemblies






Spring Play

The music for this light operetta was played by volunteer LUHS band students. The musical was also under the direction of Mr. Butler and Mr. Knight.








Heart favors on the walls and pink and white balloons surrounded the Elk's club ballroom as 152 couples danced at this year's Junior/Senior prom, held May seventh.





May Fest


This year's May Fest can be described as being more than successful. Held on Friday the 13th, the day was sunny and perfect for outdoor activities.

Attendance and participation were tremendous and everybody had fun and got to catch some rays at the same time.



Award winners on the freshman team this year were Lori Morgan and Ann Gall (Tie) Most Inspirational, and Shauna Bishop Most Improved.






Although boys' varsity soccer ended with a 6-6 record, coach Mike Schafer felt the 1982 season was an immense success.



Girls Gymnastics




This year's JV wrestling team was a very young team, consisting mainly of freshman and sophomores. But they came through the season shinning, as they remained undefeated in league.







The Lebanon Boy's Varsity Basketball team played a tough season and an even tougher league.


The team ended with a 7-11 record overall.





Coach Phillips feels that since this was a young team with only one senior and one junior, a lot of experience was gained, and that they should be a much improved team next year.





The Freshman rally also participated in bake sales, car washes, and sold programs at the footballgames, with half the proceeds going to the football players fund.






Language Arts



Probably the most effective classes being taught in the school were among the Student Services Department.

The basic concept of the learning center is as follows: they work with students who have learning problems, assist with math and basic communications classes to meet graduation requirements and competencies in these areas; teacher vocational classes, work experience and living skills classes for students not meeting requirements for a regular diploma. Those classes prepare students for adult living and getting a job. The interpersonal skills class helps students understand themselves as people, and deal effectively with problems; speech and language therapy is provided for students with difficulty in expressive language; adaptive P.E. class which works with students on improving individual physical condition; and finally, the peer tutor program, which trains capable and responsible students to work with less capable students in content area classes. This provides one-to-one help with academics.




Counselors

Due to the busing issue earlier this year, the buses don't have as complex routes as before. They now have designated stopping points to let students off,










Graphic Communications club is designed for students seeking a career in architectural and mechanical drafting.
