the good times and the bad, to pick you up when your feeling down, to help you with the big and little descisions, and you know that you'd be there for them also.


So change is a big part of your high school years, learn to deal with it gracefully and enjoy a successful four years. Choose not to accept it and prepare to deal with many regrets.






From after game dances, spirit week, plays, athletic events, ASB elections to senior skip day, LUHS Activities played the most important role in forming *Warrior Paranoia*.


Warrior activities involved everyone. From freshmen to seniors, every student at LUHS participated.


"The highlight of the year was being a princess on the Winter Dance court. Everyone involved spent a lot of time making it a memorable evening.!" stated senior Marcy Murry.



'He Touched Our Lives'

Extensive plans to honor a long-time former Lebanon Union High School educator and principal have

been completed.

More than \$6,000 was needed to fulfill organizers' dreams dedicating an outside wall, an inside wall and a trophy case at Lebanon High, estimated John Stolsig, chair of the committee to memorialize L.F. "Bud" Page, teacher, coach and principal at LUHS.

Page, who passed away last November, spent 40 years as an educator at LUHS. He started as a business teacher in 1940. Three years later he started coaching. His fields included football, basketball and baseball. In 1953 until he retired in 1980, Page was principal of Lebanon High.

The committee had asked the high school board of directors to rename the LUHS gym and auditorium the "Bud Page Activity Center."

The outside east wall of the gym was repainted. The background color is white. In the middle of the wall the Lebanon High mascot, the Warrior, is repainted in a blue outline color. Red and blue color bands are painted along the top of the wall and down both sides. Three quartz lights are affixed at the top of the 100' wide by 25' high outside wall. The middle light shines down on the Warrior mural.



Across the top of the wall is an 18" "lifetime" metal lettering which reads: Bud Page Activity Center.

On the inside of the building, the "half wall" between the gym and the auditorium is redone in oak paneling 21' wide 6' high. A 3' by 3' bronze relief bust of Bud Page is put on the wall. Wooden lettering around the bust says the following: He Touched Our Lives, Bud Page, 40 Years Serving Our Community, 1940-1980.

The final segment is a trophy case on the south side of the above-mentioned inside wall. The case contains pictures of Bud Page at 10year intervals, with some written history about him at

each stage.

This Bud Page memorial was funded only through private money. School officials then deposited the funds in a special bank account that had been set up for the memorial.

The District UH-1 school board approved the plans.

When Page came to Lebanon High in 1940 there were 465 students in six grades. The school was located at what is now the Lebanon Middle School. The school's population more than doubled by the time he

Page accepted the Lebanon teaching position after graduating from Oregon State University in business, world history and P.E.

He started coaching in 1943. In 10 years, his teams won five district basketball titles. In 1946, the Lebanon football, basketball and baseball teams all won district titles. The basketball team placed fourth in state. That same year he was named coach of the Shrine All-Star baseball team. Page was a member of the Presbyterian Church, Lebanon Elks Lodge, Lebanon Masonic Lodge, the Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity, and the Santiam Fish and Game Association.

During morning break on May 3, 1990, about 600 LUHS students took part in a sit-in at the student center to protest the cancellation of Mayfest.

The peaceful demonstration quickly turned into a riot as students filled the front yard and parking lot of the school.

Participats refused to at-

tend class until a decision was made by the administration to bring back Mayfest.

At least \$750 worth of damage was done to student center tables and tree limbs outside the school. Students climbed into trees, on top of the roof, and on top of a school bus that they stopped on the street. The bus was not damaged.

After a while the police came to calm the crowd. Mr. Reiling let students out for an early lunch, breaking up the protest. Most students returned to class.

Reiling later met with a student committee comprised of Kim Hildebrandt, Jackie Widman, Liz Ahearn, Lonnie James, Dusty Holler and Joe McKinney in hopes of solving the situation.

It was finally decided that there was not enough time or money to have Mayfest this year, but plans would be made to have one in 1991.

This is an experience that will last a lifetime for both the high school students and the 6th graders.









'Closing Out A Decade'






At 5:04 p.m. on October 17, the earth shook in northern California. An EARTHQUAKE that measured 7.0 on the Richter Scale destroyed parts of Oakland and San Francisco and surrounding areas. More than 60 were killed, hundreds were injured and the damage topped \$2 billion.

It was the worst oil spill in history. The ALASKA OIL SPILL occured on March 24, 1989 when the oil tanker ExxonValdez ran aground in Prince William Sound. A total of 11million gallons of crude oil covered the area and created an environmental nightmare.







"Practices were hard, but the conditioning really paid off in the games," commented freshman Tommy Sommer.









As a team, the girls improved tremendously toward the end of the season. They had near wins over N. Salem and Sprague, which improved their playing on the whole.



"I have to admit, I was a little nervous about all the running that everyone said we would be doing, but I thought that he did a good job," laughed Michelle Pinfold.


Hope is in the air for the upcoming freshman. As long as they are in the hands of former Head Coach Marty Mundy, they are in for a terrific season.

They had an outstanding season with an overall record of 14-6 and a perfect 9-0 in league action.



The most consistent wrestlers were Jason Cota with a 10-0 record, and Kyle Odegard with a 14-1 record.





"Even though we got off to a late start, we worked hard and pulled through in the end," commented junior Chris Wilson.


The highlight of the season was that the first two teams that the men lost to, they beat in Districts. There was a finalist in every event except for the backstroke.

"I thought we swam really well, but I wish we could have grabbed that extra point. Oh well!" said senior Alisa Whitelaw.


Most valuable swimmers were Matt Little, and Candace Robertson. "Both boys and girls were strong in all four strokes and that was our main strength," ended Coach Nadig

"It was really exciting winning our first league match, and we had a lot of fun doing it," boasted junior Wendy Rudolph.


Most of the women will be returning next year, and it should be their best season ever.







Lebanon's Close-Up club took students to Washington D.C. where they were able to get a first hand look at the nation's government.


Traveller Cara Miller stated that the trip was well worth the money spent to go.


At football games, seniors were always in






CHANGES.....

"I would like to be a dermatologist, my plans will not change I've wanted to do this for a long time." Amber Weaver said, very sure of herself.





Science may not be one of the most wanted classes to take in high school, but is is definately one of the most important.






This year was Sam Holmes' eighth year as the Electronics teacher at LUHS. He has had past experiences in the electronic industry and was well qualified for this position.

In Child Developement this year there was a large amount of students who were interested in working with the students.





Enduring pressure in forms which most students fail to come in contact with until after they leave high school was accomplished by 27 Warrior yearbook staff members during the 1989-90 school year.

The revolutionary happenings of the previous year continued; challenging the entire community to let go of some of the outdated yearbook traditions which were witnessed in the 1960s and '70s.

"The biggest challenged that the Warrior yearbook members took on was their attempt to pull LUHS into the 80's as far as yearbook goes; even though we were going into the '90s," explained ad-

viser Stan Talbott.

Pulling the book into the '80s included: the addition of more copy (stories) for the purpose of making the book an actual "history book" rather than soley a "picture book"; having a consistent background for senior pictures which allowed for the viewing of people rather than trucks, dogs, guns, helmets, and other paraphenilia; the continuing expansion of the use of the Macintosh computers to use advanced graphics and text uses in addition to "in-house" page layout.

The first major form of pressure appeared as the 1989 book arrived a bit later than most of the LUHS students when it hit the school in October. This was a jolt to the systems of many LUHS students since the previous yearbooks were delivered in the spring of the pre-

ceding five years.

"When are they going to get here?!!i" echoed throughout the halls and yearbook members constantly had to attempt to explain how 80 percent of the books in the state were delivered in the fall and we weren't "just being weird" at LUHS.

"We suffered through a lot of controversial issues," admitted Co-editor Steve Woods. "All of the changes we attempted to make were, we felt, in the best interests of

the school.

Woods, with fellow co-editor, Jill Elliott, and the rest of the Warrior staff attempted to model the yearbook after South Eugene High's: The Axe, which was deemed the best yearbook in America at the National Journalism Education Association convention in April.

"We realized though that with our resources that we're a few years away from reaching the level that South had attained," added Woods. "As soon as the staff can get the wall removed for ample work space, a telephone for advertising and other purposes and additional Macintoshes, then the stage will be set for LUHS to climb into the upper echelon of yearbooking."

Deadline pressure was constant and conquered much better than the previous year. The book was put to bed on June 16.

"A yearbook is a mountain which only a handful of students can take on and conquer each year," added Talbott. "I'm proud of these kids for attempting to please more that 1,200 people; it sure wasn't easy."

Newspaper took a lot of dedication this year. After publishing the ten issues of the school paper, the staff also had to take alot of slack from the others students at LUHS.

Newspaper and Yearbook are quite a bit alike, but they are also very different. Newspaper puts out ten issues during a year, while yearbook puts out an entire book consisting of 241 pages.

But the key point that draws the fine line between Yearbook and Newspaper is that Yearbook has a whole year to get the book published, but Newspaper only has about one month to get each issue published on time.

Mike Grey, the Newspaper advisor, feels that the LUHS Newspaper staff does a great job, and that this years issues brought great success to the staff and himself.



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
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
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
