













Before the sound of the first whistle, motopponents throughout the league would not have guessed that Lebanon would once again rank near the top.




Like in any sport, teamwork played a big part in varsity football this year. Each player knew that if for some reason they could not carry out a play, their teammates would come through for them.

A Challenging Season Tougher Opponents





























With teamwork and dedication the team reached a goal many opponents feared - a winning season.










A Time for




















Foreign Language Classes






Bible Study: Because We Live in Uncertain Times




