

Our headline font was A+L-T SIONTIE, with an AHT Harold sub-head, while our caption font was AHJ Opus and most importantly our cover font was NETGIP. We produced a 208 page book with a 16 page supplement, making a total of 224 pages and printed 900 copies at \$46 each, \$52 after December 15th, or \$55 after June 1st. 





Students enrolled in band have more fun than humans should be allowed to have.



Is there a hidden desire to be in this crowded building, underneath all the hostility and rebellion?


The answer is found within each of us, in that small place you hide the thoughts you share with only the people closest to you.








Sophomore Rebecca Lynn Hollander started her interest in art when she was around five years old. Since then she has adapted her own style and expresses herself through many venues.

Since the high school allowed off campus lunch, students had the freedom to choose where to eat as long as they are back in time for their next class.
























