This book is 8.5 by $11^{\prime \prime}$ and is printed by Herff Jones on 100 \# Premier Premium paper. The staff used Macintosh computers with InDesign CS for all page production, while photos were taken with Canon Digital Rebels or Fuii Film Finepix 6602 s and we used Adobe Photoshop CS for all of our photo editing. Our headline font was A+1J Sowerm, with an AHF Harold sub-head, while our caption font was AHJ Opus and most importantly our cover font was AHE RIEID We produced a 208 page book with a 16 page supplement, making a total of 224 pages and printed 900 copies at $\$ 46$ each, $\$ 52$ after December 15 th, or $\$ 55$ after June 1st.
