



Our system prepares us to step right into our future schools and careers, knowing what we are doing and to be great at it. We are all ready to serve when OUR time is at hand.








They Came From Assay





keep up with the strict new attendance policy.


This year the changes were tough and we had to work through them, but in hindsight you have to admit they were not really that bad.








The band begins to play and students file in to gym as the new intense pep assembly is about to kick off.























































The Herff Jones yearbook representatives were Bill and Cindy Dubé and Jeff Smith. The plant customer service representative was Chris Speth.












